To save Earth, waste needs to have an afterlife

Our planet is facing three crises of climate change, nature and biodiversity loss, and pollution and waste. Driving these crises are unsustainable consumption and production practices. We are at a critical crossroads where the only option is to choose the path of

A circular economy can address environmental crises, decouple economic growth from material dependency, and generate an annual economic output of \$4. 5 trillion by 2030. Circularity opens opportunities through new markets, cutting costs and risks, and fostering innovation.

The problem is only 8. 6% of the global economy today can be considered circular. The extraction of resources has grown three-fold since 1970 and is expected to grow another 70% by 2050. That's why we need to sharpen our focus on repurposing and redirecting production, consumption, and economic systems towards circularity.

Not Just The 3 R's

A circular process is more than the '3 R's' of reduce, reuse and recycle. An expanded '9 R' concept of circularity includes reducing by being more resource-efficient, refusing to use certain products or resources, redesigning, reusing, repairing, refurbishing, re-manufacturing, repurposing and recycling.

In India, as elsewhere, the plastics, electronics and textiles sectors have enormous potential for circularity.

Since 1950, global plastic output growth has averaged 9% every year, contributing to an increase in marine and riverine plastic litter. Efficient circulation of plastics in the economy can be fostered by eliminating unnecessary plastic items, ensuring reuse, and recycling. There is a need for effective collection infrastructure, self-sustaining business mechanisms, and an enabling regulatory landscape. UNEP in India is supporting national and local governments by developing roadmaps to reduce plastic pollution.

The textiles and fashion industry also contributes to plastic microfibers entering oceans, increased water consumption, and emissions of greenhouse gases and air pollutants. UNEP in India is mainstreaming sustainability and circularity in the textile sector through a pilot roadmap for Sustainable Textile Hub in the Surat textile cluster, a sustainable fashion curriculum with National Institute of Fashion Technology, and promoting design innovation through Circular Design Challenge.

Electronic waste is another sector that needs urgent focus. The world generated 53. 6 million metric tonnes (MT) of electronic waste in 2019. It is projected to touch 74 MT by 2030. In 2019, only 17. 4% of e-waste was collected and recycled. Designing to increase product life, promoting repair and refurbishment, and improving recycling can close the loop towards circularity.

Sustainable food systems play an important role in enhancing economy-wide circularity. Regenerative food production, use of local products, diversification of agriculture and crop varieties, and agroforestry are some examples. Preventing food wastage, redistributing edible fractions, and turning inedible food waste into inputs for new products can help circularity.

New Thinking Needed

Financing is the key to the future of circularity. Financial institutions and investors must be an integral part of the transition. It is important for institutions to integrate circularity into organisational strategies, risk-mitigation policies, new product development, and client engagement.

UNEP Finance Initiative offers support to catalyse actions for sustainable financing. UNEP's Principles for Responsible Banking was launched in 2019 with 130 banks holding \$47 trillion in assets at launch. It is a framework aligning the strategies of banks with the Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Agreement. It has grown to 275 signatories with total assets worth \$72 trillion (45% of global banking assets).

Instruments such as Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) for various sectors, deposit and collection schemes for resource recovery, and public procurementcriteria that promote circularity in markets will be critical in this transition. In India, policies like national automobile scrappage, draft blue economy, EPR for plastics packaging, steel scrap recycling, draft national resource efficiency, and upcoming sectoral action plans on circular economy are noteworthy developments in the transition from a linear to a circular economy. Recently, EPR rules were notified for plastic packaging with targets for collection, recycling and use of recycled plastics. India is also a member of Global Alliance on Circular Economy and Resource Efficiency, which aims to provide a global impetus for initiatives related to the circular economy transition. UNEP is supporting the Government of India in

developing sustainable public procurement criteria for select products.

There is an overarching need for the world to reinvent itself. The writing is on the wall – change or perish. Sustainable consumption and production hold the key to this change, and eventually the health of our businesses, our people, and our planet.



Decline in youth mental health during COVID-19: US CDC

A new study published by the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found more than a third of high school students reported in 2021 they experienced poor mental health during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Meanwhile, 44 per cent of high school students reported they persistently felt sad or hopeless during the past year, Xinhua news agency reported citing the new data published on Thursday.

The new analysis also described some of the severe challenges youth encountered during the pandemic.

More than half reported they experienced emotional abuse by a parent or other adult in the home, while over a quarter reported a parent or other adult in their home lost a job, according to the

CDC data.

In addition, over a third of students said they experienced racism before or during the Covid-19 pandemic.

The highest levels were reported among Asian, African-American and other students of multiple races, according to the CDC study.

The study, which is the CDC's first nationally representative survey of high school students during the pandemic, can inform effective programmes.

"These data echo a cry for help," said CDC Acting Principal Deputy Director Debra Houry.

"The Covid-19 pandemic has created traumatic stressors that have the potential to further erode students' mental wellbeing. Our research shows that surrounding youth with the proper support can reverse these trends and help our youth now and in the future."

More youths in Kerala involved in drug related cases: Excise department

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: Last year, the excise department filed cases against 293 youngsters, aged under 20, for drug-related offences, which illustrates the increasing involvement of youngsters in drug use and sales in Kerala.

Data available with the department also mentions that it has come to the notice of the government that there are many rackets that are trying to lure students by supplying it to them and also drawing them into their trade web. The excise department had registered 15,446 cases under Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act from 2019 till February 28, 2022, in which 15,841 persons have been arrested.

Though the state government has initiated programs like

Nervazhi to bring back the students, who are involved in drug use and sales and helping them for a course correction, the number of students getting attracted to drugs, especially synthetic ones, are on the rise, said excise department officials.

The trend is evident from the fact that at least four major cases relating to DJ parties this year, where synthetic drugs were used, have been busted by the excise team. On April 10 last year, excise and customs conducted a combined operation in four hotels in Kochi, where synthetic drugs like lysergic acid diethylamide (LSD) and MDMA (methylenedioxy-methamphetamine, commonly known as ecstasy) were found

Same year, more such parties were busted in Vagamon, Kochi and Poovar in the state capital (on December 5) and the same types of drugs were seized at these parties. In all, excise officials seized 16.06kg of hashish, 18.18g of heroin, 103.78g of brown sugar, 6.13kg of MDMA and 3.657g of LSD from various peddlers and end users last year. The quantity of MDMA seized by excise officials in 2019 was 230.015g, which increased to 564.116g in 2020 which has now increased by manifold this year.

Though synthetic drugs are making inroads among drug users, traditional ones like ganja have not taken a backseat. But the earlier trends of seizing small quantities have made way to large quantity seizures. In the last two years, the excise enforcement squad in Kerala, functioning under the direct control of the excise commissioner, has seized more than three tonnes of ganja. In 2021, the department had seized 5,632.6kg of ganja and 760 ganja plants.

By Anand 11 February 2022, 02:21 PM IST Thiruvananthapuram: In a shocking revelation, statistics released by the state police department indicates that 3,549 POCSO cases were registered in the state between January 1 and December 31, 2021.

Further, 16,418 cases were registered for crimes against women. This is the highest number of cases reported in the last six years.



As many as 3,019 POCSO cases were registered in 2020, which is slightly less than that of the 3,609 cases in 2019. However, the relaxation in Covid-19 norms has further increased the cases reported across the state. Since 2016, the number of cases has alarmingly increased despite stringent measures taken to tackle the issue.

The highest number of cases were reported in Malappuram (457), Thiruvananthapuram rural (318), and Palakkad (251). The least number of cases were in Kannur city (93), Kannur rural (97) and Ernakulam city (110). Earlier, the state government had directed the police force to constitute special wings to investigate cybercrimes, economic offences as well as cases registered under the POCSO act.


To tackle the issue of crime against children, the state cabinet on Wednesday has also approved 28 fast-track special courts. With this, the number of fast-track courts in the state has become 56.

Crime Against Women

The crimes against women have increased steadily across the state in recent years. The statistics revealed that there were 2,318 cases of rape, 4,269 cases of molestation, and 5,016 cases of cruelty from husband/ relatives during last year alone. The number of cases has also jumped from 12,659 in 2020 to 16,418 in 2021.



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

Daily habits that affect your eyesight

Synopsis

Addressing visual impairment is a major health issue across the globe, and while a number of factors are responsible for poor vision, including age, genetics, and the environment, everyday habits are just as important. Too much screen time: Working for long hours, especially on a computer has become a reality for many people around the world. The pandemic and the work-from-home culture meant that people have to work virtually for long hours every

day. Such a lifestyle can inevitably cause significant strain on your eyes and lead to eye-related problems if not properly checked. A condition often associated with this is "screen-sightedness" or computer vision syndrome. The 20-20-20 technique is a simple yet effective way to take frequent breaks to reduce the stress on your due to extended use of digital devices. Spend at least 20 seconds every 20 minutes looking at something 20 feet away.

Eating eye health-deficient diet: Including foods containing omega-3 fatty acids, zinc, vitamins C and E, and dark leafy greens, nuts, eggs, oranges, and seafood can help maintain eye health.

Not resting enough: Lack of sleep, especially when it happens on a regular basis, can have many negative effects on our health, both short-term and long-term, including a weakened immune system, weight gain, heart disease, high blood pressure, mood changes, and memory issues. It also affects the health of our eyes significantly. Not resting enough can manifest in bloodshot eyes, dark circles, blurred vision, dry eyes, and other conditions. According to research, the eyes need about 7 to 9 hours of good sleep daily to replenish themselves and function well.

Rubbing your eyes all day can also cause some damage to your sight. Rubbing the eyes can break blood vessels present under your eyelids. When the eyes are irritated, instead of rubbing the eyes, try applying a cold compress instead.

Not wearing sunglasses can also have harmful effects on your eyes. Our eyes are vulnerable to ultraviolet rays and weather elements which can affect the health of our vision in numerous ways. Wearing the right sunglasses on a regular basis can prevent the development of macular degeneration or cataracts. Beyond that, sunglasses also help protect against dry-eye syndrome by blocking the wind and dust that could gain access to your eyes.

Staying dehydrated. Water is essential for the body to help maintain hydration. Our eyes rely on water to help keep them lubricated in the form of tears. It is quite normal for dust, dirt, and other debris present in the air to sneak into our



Why are so many Indians stressed?

82% of Indians are stressed out today. The rising stress levels even made India earn the title of being the most depressed country in the world, some years back.

Mental illnesses should no way be stigmatized and the right help, taken at the right time can nip a lot of problems in the bud.



Kerala sees rise in child marriages during pandemic

KOCHI: Child marriages have risen in Kerala, which boasts of being the state with the highest literacy in the country. As many as 86 child marriages have taken place in the state in 2020 and 2021 till August, as per data from the women and child development department.

As per records, 45 marriages took place in the first eight months this year as against 41 last year. The highest number of marriages were reported from Wayanad district, due to the cohabitation culture among tribespeople, said officials.

In Wayanad, 27 child marriages happened last year and it rose to 36 in the first eight months this year. Kottayam, Idukki, Ernakulam, Malappuram, Thiruvananthapuram, Thrissur also witnessed child marriages in single digits. In Ernakulam, two child marriages happened this year and both were reported from migrant families and the marriage function was in other states, said child protection officials. "The families are staying in Ernakulam. But the weddings took place in Tamil Nadu and Pondicherry. We came to know about it when they returned," said an official of the district child protection unit.

Covid could be one of the reasons for the rise in child marriages as family elders think that cost-effective marriages can be conducted during the pandemic, said officials. "We get information from the field that many parents think that since the girl child is attending online classes, it is better to get her married. The government gives Rs 2,000 as aid for education of each child from poor families. There are 160 such beneficiaries in Malappuram. The child's father may be dead or alcoholic or may have abandoned the family. In majority of the

cases, the child's mother was married off at an early age and deprived of higher education. Though she is healthy, lack of education is a hindrance to secure a job. Patriarchy is also a reason," says Fazal Pullat, child protection officer in Malappuram.

When a minor girl is married off, Pocso case is registered against her husband and parents under the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, which invites three years of imprisonment. Child welfare committees attend to such cases.

"What worries us most is that child marriages happen in families of guest workers who stay here. The marriage function is conducted in their respective states. The case of a 11-year-old girl married off to a 16-year-old boy came to our notice this month. Parents of both children are willing to get them married. In some cases, teenagers enter into a relationship and consummate their love even before the girl turns 18 years. This forces the parents to get them married off at the earliest," says Bitty K Joseph, Ernakulam CWC chairperson.

Women hope for a safe city in 2023

Thiruvananthapuram: In 2022, sexual and physical assault cases reported against women in public spaces shocked the residents. It also raised questions about the safety of women in the state capital. However, thanks to the steely determination and brave approach of those who survived these attacks, the cases were reported and arrests were made in some cases.

The culprit behind the sexual misconduct suffered by a civil service coaching institute student in Yuvadhara Lane in Pandit Colony, Kowdiar, in November is yet to be identified. While the search is still on, the survivor talks about her experience and what can be improved in terms of our current security system.

"In my case, we had to rely on the visuals from CCTV cameras placed on the houses in the lane. The attacker was apparently stalking us from the main junction. I believe the whole process could have been easier if there were cameras placed in public spaces too. The offender seems to have committed similar crimes in the past too, but it seems nobody filed any complaints. I think women should come forward and report to the authorities when incidents like these happen. It can truly open up possibilities for catching such offenders eventually without hitting roadblocks in between. Staying indoors in fear is never a solution," she said.

The city was rather shaken by the Museum assault case against a lady doctor, which happened in October. According to the survivor, in the present age, technology does play a major role in identifying criminals, but it does not make up for the crucial intervention required by the police force.

"Initially, I had to take the major initiative to expedite the search by bringing it to the attention of higher authorities." It is a fact that our security force strength is not proportionate to the population. Their reachability is still a huge factor that has yet to be addressed," she said.

"It seems that the culprit was a habitual offender. Boys and girls should be taught at home and at school to respect each other. We can control such unfortunate events in the future and move forward as a society only if we are willing to bring up our children in the right way," the doctor said.

Water levels in 72% wells show a declining trend

KOCHI: The erratic and deficient rainfall in 2022 will have an impact on the groundwater situation in the state in the coming summer season as both seasons were marked with a deficiency in terms of rainfall days.

According to a report by the state groundwater department which monitors the water levels in various wells across Kerala, there has been a falling trend in groundwater levels in observation wells, dug wells, and borewells in June 2022 compared to the same period in the previous year. These wells are separate from those monitored by the Central Groundwater Board.

A comparison of groundwater levels in June 2022 with the corresponding month in the previous year reveals that 72% of

observed dug wells, 65% of bore wells, and 58% of tube wells recorded a falling trend.

Also, 68% of total observation wells showed a falling trend of which 38% showed a decline in water levels less than 0.5m.

The actual rainfall received in the state in June 2022 was 53% deficient from the normal rainfall. In June 2021, the rainfall deficiency was 39%, but 2021 was a year of heavy rainfall across the year in all seasons.

The report said the dug wells showing a decline of water level of more than 2m during the long-term analysis will be monitored closely.

About 55 open wells showed more than 2m fluctuation on comparison of water level during the month with the

previous year's same month data and 24 open wells showed more than 2m fluctuation when compared to the decadal mean water level.

It recommended that suitable recharging measures be taken to enhance the water level and to avoid further fall in water level. However, the groundwater drought index of 80% of observation dug wells during June 2022 are in normal and 14% in mild categories. Around 3% are in moderate, 1% in severe, and 2% in extreme categories.



Climate change driving away marine fish towards poles: Study

NEW DELHI: Global warming is causing the majority of fish populations in the sea to relocate towards colder waters nearer the north and south poles, according to a study on the impact of climate change on oceans. The researchers from the University of Glasgow in the UK found that, in response to ocean warming, many marine fish populations are shifting towards the Earth's poles or are moving to deeper waters-all in a bid to stay cool. For marine life such as fish, the temperature of the surrounding water affects critical functions such as metabolism, growth and reproduction.

Marine species also often have a very narrow livable temperature range making even small differences in the water impossible to

cope with. As a result, marine life changes caused by global warming have been up to seven-fold faster than animal responses on land, the researchers said.

The study, published in the journal Global Change Biology, examined data on 115 species spanning all major oceanic regions, totalling 595 marine fish population responses to rising sea temperatures.

"We observed a striking trend (where) species living in areas that are warming faster are also showing the most rapid shifts in their geographical distributions," said Carolin Dahms, lead author of the study.

"It's possible that rate of warming in some regions may be too fast for fish to adapt, and so relocating may be their best coping strategy. At the same time we see that their ability to do so is also impacted by other factors such as fishing, with commercially exploited species moving more slowly," Dahms said.

While relocation to cooler water may allow these species to persist in the short-term, it remains to be seen how food-webs and ecosystems will be affected by these changes, the researchers added.
